## Greetings from the Gem State Children's Program!



### Season's Greetings,

It's hard to believe it's almost the end of 2013! It has been a whirlwind of a year for our children's program from the Children's System Redesign, to developing our new summer and afterschool programs. We are happy to report that the changes in our program have been successful and we have been able to make the most out of all of these changes. Our program is now centered around the theme of PIECES; practicing skills, independence and self-identity building, exploring interests, community integration, expanding and reinforcing skills, and socialization and friendship building.

For the past couple of months we have noticed how well each child has been able to build a healthy and positive identity from how they view themselves and how they fit in with others. Too often are children with disabilities put into categories and labeled by people who haven't taken the time to get to know them or see what they have to offer. Finding ways for each individual to express who they are and be seen in a positive light by their peers and members of the community has become a goal of mine. Like every person they have their own interests, dislikes, frustrations, hopes, and dreams that should be heard and seen by whoever is around them. Spending the time to notice who they are and how they communicate is one of the best things you can do for any child.

The activities that have been planned at the centers and in the community have provided opportunities for them to practice communicating, cooperating, and socializing with others who do and don't share the same interests. Each month a piece of character is picked that everyone is encouraged to understand and practice with words and actions. For the month of October the piece of character was respect and by the end of the month the children were using the word in their own in conversations and actions without much help from the staff. Each month the piece of character has given each individual a better understanding of who they are, and how they relate to or affect others.

These children teach me something new every day and we are so thankful for the time that we have had to get to know them. As the holiday season and end of the year is upon us we also hope that you see the same progress that we have seen and that each child continues to see themselves in a positive way.
