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### "FREE CELL PHONE SERVICE!!"

Lifeline Medicaid benefit program was introduced in the 1980's to ensure that low-income individuals and families and other assistance programs had access to communication. Today, for individuals with disabilities, especially a developmental disability, the technology gap is extensive. The common use of fax machines, email, the internet and smart phones has left many people with disabilities behind because of their specific abilities, extra training needed for use, the lack of employment opportunities that would commonly use these items and largely due to the financial barrier on a limited income.

Many people in Idaho that we serve have difficulty using a telephone, knowing important phone numbers or how to access them in an emergency situation. A literature review of current research from St. Catherine University has shown that combining technology, education and training for use has an enormous positive impact on the quality of life and independence levels for people that have intellectual and developmental disabilities. Not only do they have a greater ability to be safe and access help when needed, but the socialization access is also increased and thus, increases the quality of life and diminishes isolation from friends and the community.

There are many programs that offer the free Medicaid cell phones with 250 minutes per month, up to 1000 minutes per month for calls and text messages. Individuals that utilize benefit programs such as, Medicaid, food assistance, SSI or SSDI are qualified, as well as other qualifying programs too.

The Medicaid cell phone program only features calling and texting. There is no access to the internet, unless you pay extra for those features.

# What was that? I hear something. Can you hear it? I hear summer creeping around the corner.


Last year we "traveled the world" and it was a very fun summer as we celebrated the different
